

"To see where I'm at now is amazing. I'm living the dream. "TOUGH DAYS While he now finds himself living in a huge home with picturesque scenery all around him, Canafax speaks of his struggles, it makes one think back to a movie that was recently released. "The Pursuit of Happyness," starring Will Smith as Chris Gardner, tells the story of a man who loses almost everything before realizing his dream. Along the way he's forced to sleep in a subway bathroom with his son and must eke his way through life with almost no money. Canafax suffered a similar fate before getting to where he's at now. Some of his painful memories included having only \$2 in his wallet to feed his whole family with and bathing his children in a greyhound bus station. Canafax explained how he had bought a used vehicle and transformed it into a makeshift camper to travel around the country in. The camper didn't have running water or electricity. "When I had to take a shower I would go to a truck stop," Canafax said. "Funny enough, I always tell people that without those experiences I would have never made it to where I'm at today."

	Canafax said the most gratifying thing about his current success is the fact he endured when most would have quit.	
	"You have to understand that to become known takes years," he said. "You don't become known overnight no matter how talented you are. The only way it might be possible is if you win the lottery. Since that didn't happen to me, I had to work hard with the belief that something good would eventually come from it." SOUTHERN HOSPITALITY The 56-year-old Houma native made a promise to himself when he left south Louisiana for good.	
	He told himself that he wouldn't lose the friendly, outgoing nature that people from our area of the country are known for.	
	"My granddaddy always told me to treat everyone like they are tired, thirsty and hungry," Canafax said. "I took my small town values with me when I came out west."	

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Canafax said his friendly nature has served him well in his current occupation.

"I've always had the confidence to know I can get along with anyone because of where I'm from," he said. "At first, some people are taken a back by it, but once they understand where you're coming from, they love it."

On a recent visit to a local supermarket, Canafax started talking to someone he'd never met.

"People from here aren't used to that, but seem to get a kick out of it once you engage them," he said.

Canafax explained that whenever someone comes into his shop to inquire about him doing work on their bike he doesn't even discuss it until he gets to know them as people.

"I'll cook for them and offer them a drink," Canafax said. "After a while, the people seem amazed that I haven't even asked them what there there for. I can't help myself because that's just the way I am. I don't think I'd be as successful if it weren't for my manners and hospitality."

Canafax said the people made it hard to leave Louisiana.

The Loveland, Colo., resident left his home state in 1996.

"There's no better folks than the one's that live down there," he said. "It's definitely not easy to walk away from that. My ultimate reason for leaving had to do with the business I was in. I knew because of the marketplace I wouldn't be able to take it (my business) any further without going somewhere else."**WHAT OTHERS SAY** Canafax has developed a reputation based on what he likes to refer to as his "rolling art."

His customers swear he's one of, if not, the most-talented custom-bike artist around.

"He's got to be in the top three nationally," customer Jett McClendon said. "He's done several bikes for me and we've won lots of awards together at competitions. You'll never meet a better guy than Marshall."

One of his recent customers entrusted Canafax with a project that had special meaning to him.

Mike Duvall of Buhl, Idaho, found one of Canafax's business cards in a Harley-Davidson shop in Colorado.

Duvall had an image of what he wanted and met with Canafax to discuss his idea.

"My grandson passed away in 2004 and I wanted to pay tribute to him," Duvall said. "What he ended up doing for me is beyond words. The fine details makes him (grandson) literally come to life on my bike."

Duvall travels the country restoring homes.

In his estimation, he's been to all 50 states and hasn't seen anything that matches Canafax's work.

"I've been so impressed with him that I'm recommending him to my clients," Duvall said. "I figure he can go to their homes and paint wildlife scenes or whatever they may want."

Canafax's cousin, Guy Fanguy, said he's glad to see him doing so well.

Fanguy, who now works for the City of Thibodaux and resides in Bayou Blue, worked with Canafax for a few years in the early 1980s.

"I don't get to keep in touch with him as much as I'd like anymore, but I've seen his Web site and can tell he's grown as an artist," Fanguy said. "He's a very talented artist, and I'm glad his hard work has paid off for him."
